

No slow spots in this story. The author has created a great sense of anticipation on nearly every page - what is going to happen next? She is also very talented in painting pictures with words; the characters are developed or portrayed very well. Much is said without a lot of embellishment; and the reader easily constructs the mental images that give the story texture. This book was an inspiration for me to travel to see the coral reefs of the Caribbean, and the tropical forests of Central America. I just returned from a trip to a Caribbean island to explore coral reefs. While there, I met an old man who practices bush medicine. I plan to return as soon as possible to record the plants he uses and the practices of his herbal tradition before this knowledge is lost. If I hadn't read this book I

I think i would give this book a different title. I live in Belize and i expected it to be more focused on survival there than on personal survival in an abusive marriage as did several friends of mine who picked it up for a travel read which it is not. It is a very heavy read and i am still reeling from reading her account of abuse. It seems that in choosing to weave the stories of her adopted country and her abuse together she played off the contrast of her many strengths and then the horrid abuse she suffered. It did offer me insight into what it was like in those yrs. and not much has changed, it is still a rough lawless little country which did not help her situation one bit . I have been to many of the

places , including Key West and all over Belize in the past 20 yrs. and know of many people mentioned in the book . I was somewhat stunned to hear such a negative account of The Farm as i have a friend who had a very positive experience w/ childbirth there at that same time. I guess we all have very different experiences and i wonder how much the abusive relationship overshadowed such experiences. I honor Nancys story and her work , i was astounded at how anyone so intelligent and strong in so many ways could tolerate such abuse for so long . I just want to grab her & her children out of the story and say ENOUGH , YOU ARE STRONG ! But i also know that abuse happens to women of all walks of life and she gives an important account of this for anyone suffering abuse. My husband and i read the book because of our Belize experiences and appreciate her story but we both had to skip over much of the abuse as it was just so horribly brutal. Thank you Nancy for sharing this and for all that you do now to help abused women.

I was very moved by this book. I was born and raised in Belize and I feel so sorry that this had to happen to her. So many people would have come to her rescue if she hadn't been so isolated ( but that is exactly what abusers tend to do, isolate). Belize is still a beautiful country, and thankfully, many of those archaic laws have changed and there are many who are fighting domestic violence on the legal front. I recognized many of the characters in the book even though the names were changed. It is truly accurate in its portrayal of the food, language, people and events. I objected to just one line in her book- she called Belize a "silly little country". It is little, but maybe not so silly, people who had the vision saw the potential in her and left their mark, as she did. There are not too many countries in the world where it is still possible to do this. Culturally, Belize is still being shaped and formed by precisley those who venture to call her home, no matter where they came from.
